FOIA and the Military

Each DOD Component, to include the military services, Department of Defense agencies, and combatant commands, responds to requests for its own records. Instructions for submitting a FOIA request in *DOD Freedom of Information Handbook* or in individual DOD Service Center websites. Agencies may charge fees related to storage, retrieval and delivery of information open under freedom of information act. Military Records– Don't look for what you can't find

WW II Draft Registration cards - Destroyed records, never microfilmed:

✓ Alabama	✓ Georgia	✓ Mississippi	✓ South Carolina
✓ Florida	✓ Kentucky	✓ North Carolina	✓ Tennessee

Some ancestry.com WWII Draft files **scanned incorrectly** (*ancestry.com only*): Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia. Back of one draft card appears in same image as front of next person's card. Correct front side of draft card, but back side of previous person's card.

1890 veterans census - some destroyed: Alabama - Kansas, and half of Kentucky (beginning of alphabetic order of states through the first half of Kentucky)

Nov 1800 fire destroyed Rev War pensions and bounty-land-warrant applications and related papers submitted before that date. Some files have cards noting that further papers not available.

NPRC fire, 12 Jul 1973: 16-18 million veteran records destroyed

80% Army discharged between 1912 – 1960 with names after Hubbard, James E.

75% of Air Force discharged between 1947 – 1964

Some U.S. Army Reserve

Remember, however, that if the veteran applied for benefits of any kind, then some restored records should be available.

Archival OMPF (Official Military Personnel File) records: Discharge date of 1956 or prior* (62 years) open to public and can be ordered online for copying fee

Non-archival Discharge date of 1958 or after*: Access restrictions: Military veteran or next of kin (unremarried spouse, sibling, parent, child)

*rolling date—62 years after discharge
